**10 YEARS OF CONNECTING PEOPLE TO PLACE FOR ACTION
A TIMELINE OF THE BRWA**

2006
The Battle River Watershed Alliance (BRWA) was incorporated as a non-profit society.

2007
Battle River Index of Biological Integrity study found that the river had a score of 47%, meaning the river has levels of poor fishing species of concern and levels of no fishing/species at risk.

2008 Ready for take off: the Aerial Velocography project of the Battle River began.

2009 Work on "Our Battle" State of the Watershed Report was initiated.

2009 BRWA became regional coordinator for Agrium's Caring for our Watersheds Contest.

2010 Education and Outreach programs expanded with the first:
- Annual Battle River Watershed Festival
- Alberta Salsation Pie Baking Competition
- Spirit of the Watershed Art Workshop
- PhotoVoice Stewardship at Shutter Speed

2011 "Our Battle" State of the Watershed Report was completed.
The BRWA started its watershed management planning work.

2012 The inaugural OTIS Award recognized local citizens for their outstanding stewardship.

2012 Ferry Point Riparian Restoration Program was launched. Staff and community members traveled by bicycle 550km across the watershed in the Rolling down the River Bike Tour.

2013 The second of four Battle River First Nations Water Ceremonies was held along the Battle River near Maskwacis.

2014 The Government of Alberta approved the Water Management Plan for the Battle River Basin. BRWA staff worked with the Alberta Water Council Water Literacy Project Team.

2015 Potoska Riparian Restoration Program was launched.

2016 The BRWA celebrated its 10 year anniversary!

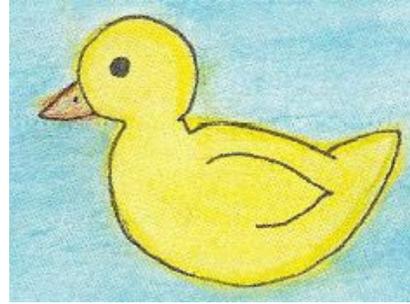
Stewardship Update- 2016 OTIS Award

Landowners, with support from local organizations have made the 2nd year of the Ponoka Riparian Restoration Program a great success! A few highlights include:

- 18 riparian health assessments by Cows & Fish,
- Over 10,000 trees planted in the Battle River valley with the Agroforestry and Woodlot Extension Society,
- 6 kilometers of riparian fencing and
- 6 off-site watering systems have been installed to manage livestock access to waterways,
- Riparian Field Day at MSW Farms in Ponoka

Did you Know?



97 lakes, 62 rivers and 3 oceans. This is the number of lakes, rivers and waterways that are protected under the Navigation Protection Act right now.

Before the Harper Government changed freshwater protections, the law was called the Navigable Waters Protection Act and it protected every lake and every river.

The Trudeau government has announced a review of environmental and freshwater laws. The Council of Canadians are pressuring the Trudeau government to keep their election promises and "restore lost protection" to our waterways.
