

Residents Report Poor Water Quality and Fish Dying Due to Low Water Levels

BRWA has received calls from a number of residents this past week about low water levels in the Battle River. In several cases there were reports of algal blooms, and fish and clams stranded and dying. Staff have been monitoring the water flows closely this summer. Data from July 30, 2024, available on the <u>Rivers Alberta website</u>, show flow rates at various sites along the Battle River ranging from 0.0 to 1.3 cubic meters per second (cms). See monitoring station data below.

If you see these types of conditions, please report through the Government of Alberta's Environmental Response Line. When reporting fish kills, Stephen Spencer, Senior Fisheries Biologist, has indicated that the approximate numbers, species and location are essential to document the event.

Battle River Flow Update

Data from July 30, 2024, show the following flow rates at various sites along the river:

- Upstream of Ponoka 0.03 cms
- Highway 21 near Duhamel 0.00 cms

- Highway 53 near Forestburg 0.32 cms
- Highway 872 near Brownfield 1.30 cms
- Near SK border 0.89 cms



How to use the Rivers Alberta website:

- 1. Zoom in until the individual monitoring station icons are visible.
- 2. Click on a station icon to see the real-time flow rate (the middle number).
- 3. Optionally, check other icons for data in table format or view weekly and yearly graphs.

City of Camrose Stage 2 Water Restriction

Effective July 15, 2024, the City of Camrose implemented Stage 2 of its Water Shortage Response Plan, which is referenced as a water "warning". Mandatory water restrictions are now in effect to promote water sustainability. Stage 2 restrictions include:

- · Scheduled lawn watering
- · Permitted use of rain barrels at any time

· Commercial car washes, buckets or handheld hoses only




Sign Up for Fall Field Trips
